NEW BUSINESS

This matter was scheduled to discuss, consider and possibly vote to set a date for a

public hearing to amend the fines as listed in the Animal Control Ordinance.

Mr. Rosso updated the Council on the status of the fines in the Animal Control

ordinance, noting that he had reached out to Representative Kennedy asking him to

sponsor this proposal. Our fines, compared to other municipalities, are still

extremely low. Mr. Rosso shared an excel spreadsheet of the fines that other

municipalities in the state have in their ordinance. The fines before the ordinance

was changed were \$10 for the first offense, \$15 for the second offense, and \$25 for

the third offense. The amended ordinance changed those fines to \$25, \$50 and \$75,

respectively. Because it takes such an effort to get these bills passed and they have

to have a sponsor and it has to go to the House and the Senate for approval, he felt

it would be prudent for the Council to discuss this now and decide if he should

continue to move forward with this process.

The Council discussed a date for a public hearing and decided on February 20,

2024.
